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Industrial Maintenance Technology

The Industrial Maintenance Technology program is designed to train students for employment and advancement in today's technologically advanced industrial workplace. Portions of the curriculum will be online and include virtual labs. Most Industrial Maintenance Technology classes will be hybrid courses. This will allow students to complete some coursework at home or in the computer lab while still maintaining face-to-face contact with the instructor. CIS 1104 Introduction to Online Learning must be completed prior to beginning the Level I classes.

Due to the nature of the online curriculum, students will need access to high-speed Internet to complete their coursework. If not available at home, they can utilize the IMT and Anderson Library computer labs

during regular hours. The face-to-face class meetings will include review and testing of the material students covered on their own.

Class sizes are limited and those interested are encouraged to meet with an advisor as soon as possible. Students must complete the COMPASS/ASSET test and achieve minimum entry-level scores at or above the 34th percentile to enroll. Financial aid is available for those who qualify.

Job Opportunities

Refineries, power plants, manufacturers and even hospitals need technicians with mechanical and electrical training to keep their facilities operating. The certificates will prepare students for entry-level positions. The program's aptitude testing will assess students' progress and provide them with portfolios to share with potential employers.
